

Most often in ways we cannot see until we look with eyes of faith. Continue to bless these catechumens and candidates who are receiving the Church's sacraments


during this Easter Season. Fill their lives and hearts with your unending love and grace.

GOD NITE: The last of our God nites in this coming April 17. St. Joseph in Ponca is the host site and St.

Sacramentals have a sacred purpose in supporting our journey to heaven and physically signify our devotion to Jesus and Mary. Through the intercession of the Church, sacramentals supply special graces and dispose us to cooperate with them. This is why the Church asks us to handle them with reverence, even in the process of disposal. While all religious items should be treated with respect, when a religious object is blessed, it deserves a special reverence. Whether it is a marred garden statue of the Blessed Virgin Mary or a weathered St. Francis medal, <u>any item that incurs a direct blessing from a priest is forever raised to a new level of spiritual significance.</u> It would be inappropriate to throw these holy items in the trash! Most Catholics know innately that the trash bin is not the place for blessed objects. But without guidance on their correct disposal, old and broken sacramentals tend to accumulate in a drawer or closet—never to be used again, but unable to be thrown away.

Steps to Dispose of Religious Items

Follow these simple steps to dispose of your blessed items, broken rosaries, & other sacramentals that are worn beyond the possibility of continued use:

- -The best way to dispose of religious objects is to burn them to ash. This includes anything flammable such as a cord rosary, Palm Sunday palms, or a blessed image printed on canvas. Then, collect the ashes and bury them, preferably on church grounds or in a Catholic cemetery.
- -If you are unable to burn your religious items, they should be disassembled as much as possible & reverently buried. That way they cannot be used for a profane purpose if uncovered in the future. This is how you would dispose of a rosary with beads or a metal chain.
- -Broken statues & worn medals cannot be disassembled further, so these are generally laid to rest whole. Holy water should be poured directly into the ground. Again, this is preferably done on church grounds or in a Catholic cemetery.
- -If unable to burn or bury, reach out to your parish office. Parish staff are trained to collect these items & will dispose of them properly

We have the way you need to lay them to rest!

From Palm Sunday to Divine Mercy Sunday boxes will be located in the back of each church for you to place any of these items in (burnable or not).

Thomas Matya will take them to Omaha to be correctly disposed of.

What Would Mary Do?

This Easter morning, I am thinking of Mary Magdalene. I want to know her state of mind as she approached the tomb in the darkness. Was she afraid? Was she thinking clearly? Was she tired? Had grief and trauma robbed her of her sleep the last two nights? What did she intend to do? Anoint Christ's body, yes — but what else? Kiss his hands, trace the markings where the lash had fallen upon his skin? Say goodbye? Weep? Despair?

What were the words she planned to whisper into the cold, empty darkness that morning, as she wept over God's body? I don't know anything about her state of mind that Easter morning, except that I know she wanted to be with Christ. Perhaps that was all she knew, too. Perhaps she had no other thought, no other desire, than nearness to him. She didn't need to understand everything, and she didn't expect answers — she didn't dare hope for that.

But everything and everyone had fallen apart around her, and in Jesus' presence she knew her heart would be able to rest

If you have ever been in the midst of a crisis in your life and found yourself pacing the floors of your house when no one else is awake, muttering the words to a prayer you know by heart, you know what Mary Magdalene felt. In those moments, we do not always feel God's presence. Sometimes, when we look for Him, we only see an empty tomb.

When these dark moments come, I pray you will remember the faithfulness of this great saint. Be like Mary Magdalene. Look for Jesus, always. You may not always find him, but he will always find you.

A Word from Deacon Filips...

HAPPY EASTER! The church takes us through the seasons of our salvation history every year, and the passion, death, and resurrection of Jesus is the most important season. This is when we find out what our value is, how much is God is willing to pay to convince us He loves us and desires us to go to heaven to be with Him. It didn't have to be this way. God could have figuratively snapped his fingers to forgive us our sins and make us holy. He is God. He could have saved us any way He wanted, but he chose the most painful, violent, humiliating way possible. Why is that? Thomas Aquinas suggested three reasons:

- *It seems instinctive for humans to offer sacrifice to God for His favor or for repentance. You can see this in all pagan religions and in the Old Testament stories of the Jewish sacrifices.
- *The fact that God was willing to sacrifice His son for us this way should make clear to us how horrible sin is, that it takes such a high price to pay for our sins.
- *It illustrates how much God loves us that He is willing to pay such a price for us.

The church could have set up our liturgies to celebrate the birth, life, death, resurrection and ascension of Jesus every Sunday the same way all year long. But the Church in Her wisdom knows that we humans don't work that way. Just like we move through seasons of life, we move the seasons of salvation history with the church's liturgical seasons. Now we start the joyful Easter season after Christ arises and we sing the Gloria again at Mass.

Jesus is fully God and fully human. He chose to lower himself to our level and to plumb the depths of humanity by His suffering, so we could never say that our God does not understand us or our sufferings. We could never say that obedience was a bad thing, because He was obedient to his Father. Jesus was like us in every way but sin. He willingly suffered His passion for us out of love for us and obedience to his father. All He wants in return is our love and our obedience to Him so He can raise us on Judgment Day to be like Him in glory.

This month, lets pray that we and everyone we know learns to love and obey Jesus. Following is the next selection on the Mass from my book "Pearls of the Universal Church" available from www.spiritualworkspress.com

Introductory Rites of the Mass:

Holy Water: we dip the fingers of our right hand into the water, (previously blessed by the Priest), we then make the sign of the cross, touching our forehead, breast, left shoulder and right shoulder, saying "In the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit." This recollection of God's trinity recalls and renews when we were baptized with water and the sign of the cross was traced on our heads, claiming us for Christ.

<u>Genuflection and kneeling</u>; if you were to walk into Church and see Jesus standing at the altar in His robe and sandals, with His pierced hands, feet, and side, what would you do? Would you casually sit down? No, you would probably throw yourself face down on the floor begging His forgiveness! We recognize that Jesus is present in the Holy Eucharist in the tabernacle, body, blood, soul, and divinity. Genuflection and kneeling are minimal gestures of respect to Him. If unable to genuflect due to health problems, bow respectfully toward the tabernacle.

<u>Standing</u>; we traditionally stand to show respect and honor and when we are at prayer, and during the entrance procession, Gospel reading. Our Father etc.

Sitting is a posture of listening and meditation and is used for the non-Gospel readings and to meditate after Eucharist.

The Procession of the Priest, Deacon, and altar servers is ceremonial and is similar to ancient royal processions.

<u>Singing</u>; For Sunday Mass we sing hymns at the entrance, offertory, Eucharist, and dismissal. This unifies us in our words, thoughts, and melody.

<u>Greeting</u>; the Priest begins with the sign of the Cross, again reminding us of our Baptism. He says, "The Lord be with you." Which is a greeting, blessing, and a statement of faith that the Lord is now with us. We reply "And with your spirit" which returns the greeting to the Priest.

<u>Penitential Rite, Gloria</u>; We need to gather as a unified congregation, so we may recall our common need for salvation and reconciliation with God (Penitential Rite and Lord, have mercy), and let our hearts sing with the praise and glory of God (Gloria). The use of these parts varies according to the Church season. At the end of the Penitential Rite the Priest prays the prayer of absolution, which forgives venial (non-deadly) sins.

<u>The Collect Prayer</u>: The Priest calls us into unified prayer. This is an opportunity to bring our hopes and fears and sacrifices and collect them together for the Priest to present to God. We respond "Amen" which means Yes, I believe! I would stake my life on what you just said!

Pope's Intention: For the role of women. We pray that the dignity and immense value of women be recognized in every culture, and for the end of discrimination that they experience in different parts of the world.




