

# FROM THE PASTOR'S DESK BY FR. OWEN KORTE

HOLY SPIRIT CATHOLIC PARISHES MISSION: MARCH 10-12, 2024. 40 Hours like last year. Three evening services in three locations in our family. Fr. Taylor Leffler will come and preach this mission entitled: PRAYING THE MASS Many Catholics express a desire to get more out of the Mass. During our National Eucharistic Revival, how can the average person in the pew begin to find Mass more meaningful? Join Fr. # Could you explain what Perpetual Adoration is? How it started and where?

First of all there is the unchangeable truth that Jesus has left us the mass as the very connection to his Death on the Cross. When we participate at mass and receive Him in Holy Communion we are as present to His salvific event on Calvary as if were had lived back then. Furthermore, as Jesus taught in John 6: "...for my flesh is real food and by blood real drink" The Eucharist is the Body and Blood, Soul and Divinity of our Lord Jesus Christ. All of the scriptures concur on this; it is the sound teaching of Paul and those who followed directly upon the Apostles. It was the sign of unity in the Church as well and already in the 2nd Century the Pope sent the Eucharist from his mass to other bishops as a sign of unity. As monasticism grew in the church there is evidence that monks would keep the Eucharist on their person, in a small pouch. Monasteries and churches in the 400's began reserving the Eucharist often in a small room next to the chapel where mass took place. Certainly by the 800's the Sacred Species was reserved in a pyx in the high altar. It is interesting to note that one of the first unmistakable references to reserving the Blessed Sacrament is found in a life of St. Basil (who died in 379). Basil is said to have divided the Eucharistic Bread into three parts when he celebrated Mass in the monastery. One part he consumed, the second part he gave to the monks, and the third he placed in a golden dove suspended over the altar. The belief in the Real Presence throughout the first millennium was taken for granted. But in the 11th Century, doubts began to appear. Berengarius (999-1088), archdeacon of Angers in France, publicly denied that Christ was really and physically present under the species of bread and wine. Distinctions between Christ of the Gospels and the Eucharistic Christ led to this confusion. Pope Gregory, the abbot-become-pope, whose faith in the Blessed Sacrament had been nourished for years in a Benedictine monastery made Berengarius retract his teaching but serious damage had been done. Gregory's teaching on the Real Presence was quoted verbatim in Pope Paul VI's historic document Mysterium Fidei (1965) to meet a new challenge to the Eucharist in our day--very similar to what happened in the eleventh century.

"I believe in my heart and openly profess that the bread and wine placed upon the altar are, by the mystery of the sacred prayer and the words of the Redeemer, substantially changed into the true and life-giving flesh and blood of Jesus Christ our Lord, and that after the consecration, there is present the true body of Christ which was born of the Virgin and offered up for the salvation of the world, hung on the cross and now sits at the right hand of the Father, and that there is present the true blood of Christ which flowed from his side. They are present not only by means of a sign and of the efficacy of the Sacrament, but also in the very reality and truth of their nature and substance." From the eleventh century on, devotion to the Blessed Sacrament reserved in the tabernacle became more and more prevalent in the Catholic world. At every stage in this development, members of religious orders of men and women took the lead. The Benedictine Lanfranc, as Archbishop of Canterbury, introduced from France into England numerous customs affecting the worship of the Real Presence. In the 13th Century we see the creation of a special Feast in Honor of the Eucharist: Corpus Christi. St. Thomas Aquinas wrote the Liturgy of the Hours for the Holy Eucharist and composed several hymns we still use today: O Salutaris Hostia, Tantum Ergo and Panis Angelicus. At the time of the Protestant Reformation many challenges to our Catholic Doctrine had to be answered. Was Jesus always in the Eucharist? Yes, as long as its bread, He is. Was Jesus present only when you receive Him in the form of both bread and wine? No, he is completely present in either form. As the Protestants moved further and further away from the Catholic Church they disconnected more and more from the doctrine of the Holy Eucharist. Transubstantiation became the call-word for our belief in the Real Presence. The Substance of Bread changes but the Accidents (taste, feel, sight) do not. In all of this, devotion to the Holy Eucharist grew and grew within the Catholic Church. Before the end of the sixteenth century, Pope Clement VIII in 1592 issued a historic document on what was called in Italian Quarant' Ore (Forty Hours). The devotion consisted of forty hours of continual prayer before the Blessed Sacrament exposed. St. John Neumann was responsible for bringing this practice to the United States. It was not until after the Council of Trent, however, that perpetual adoration began to develop on a world-wide scale. Perpetual Adoration before the Exposed Blessed Sacrament is way more serious and demands that someone be present at all times. Mostly what we see is Perpetual Adoration before the Blessed Sacrament in the Tabernacle. Our 40 Hours will take place in all our churches of the 7 Holy Spirit Catholic Parishes and Exposition will continue for all 40 hours, just not in every church.



# A Word from Deacon Filips...

## Dear fellow prayer warriors;

I recently read a conversation between Rod Dreher, who wrote the very influential book "The Benedict Option" from a Catholic/Orthodox perspective and Aaron Renn who wrote a similar book "Life in the Negative World" from an Evangelical Christian perspective. Both thinkers agree that the easy times for Christianity are over. Within living memory, Americans lived in a proudly Christian country. We were founded on Protestant principals, but eventually Catholics and Jews were brought into the tent and accepted as part of the culture. Attending church and living by the laws and morals of Christianity enhanced your social standing, but now if you take your faith seriously you may be branded as a "Christian Nationalist" or have FBI agents infiltrate your services. Christians who don't take God and His Commandments seriously and champion progressive secular causes are mostly left alone.

We have gone from living in Christendom to being strangers in our own land in about two generations. When you are a stranger in a strange land, you must be careful about what you say so you don't insult your hosts. It is a different world when you are no longer part of the majority culture. Renn explains: "Jewshave to explain to their kids what Christmas is and why they don't celebrate it. And it doesn't have to be rooted in hostility. It's like, Okay, we're in this Christmas-saturated culture, and that's not us. And so I think we were going to have to do that. We're going to have to create our own sort of moral communities in which we uphold a different way of life, and a different standard for ourselves than the world...It's like, look, we don't smoke pot, we just don't do that. Right? We don't watch porn, we don't do that. We don't gamble on our phone, we don't do it. We just don't do that...We need to we need to build a moral community that is distinct." In other words, we need to become the "indigestible minority" in our new culture.

The survival of Christian faith in our country and in our families will require purposeful action on our part. Our children and grandchildren are no longer swimming in a clean, nutritious river. They are swimming in a sewer, and unless we intentionally build some type of shield around them, it will poison them. Unless you teach your children that they are Catholic and therefore we do certain things and we do not do other things, your grandchildren will never be baptized or raised in the faith. Start now to build up your family's faith-shield so they are indigestible by our toxic culture.

Even the dullest Mass with a terrible homily and off-key singing gives us powerful graces because heaven touches earth at every Mass. We need to try to develop a proper attitude of reverence for what actually happens at Mass.
